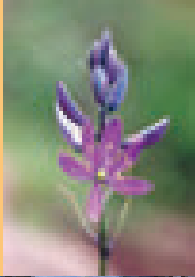
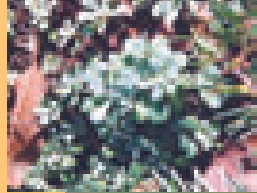


GARRY OAK/ ROCK OUTCROP

Mount Douglas Park Trails and Habitat Zones

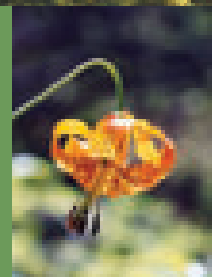
UPPER FOREST

provides a transition from the lower forest to the rock outcrops of the summit, with arbutus, Douglas-fir, big leaf maple and Garry oak trees. The shrubs and understory support an extensive bird population.



LOWER FOREST

is a dense, lush rainforest of Douglas-fir, big leaf maple, western red cedar, Pacific dogwood and yew trees. Douglas Creek meanders through the forest to the ocean.



COASTAL ZONE

hosts abundant crab, seastars and barnacles living among the rocks, kelp and eelgrass. Red alder, western red cedar, salmonberry, oceanspray and Oregon grape perch on top of a 15 m bank.
