
# Gaustablikk skipsfjell Round walk 2 h 3,6 km

MAP LICHEN Looks like a map and grows only 5 mm in 10 years




**PURPLE GENTIAN** Now rare, as a result of picking and medicinal use




ORCHID Norway's most common orchid is also called "Adam and Eve" and has been used to enhance sexual potency

#### Nature and cultural history

A reasonably demanding circular hike full of contrasts, following moderately steep trails and ski lift routes from the cottages and ski lift at Gaustablikk to the unspoiled mountain scenery and viewpoint at Skipsfjell.

From the car park at Gaustablikk Høyfjellshotell, walk through the main gate and follow the paved footpath past the ski centre. After about 100 m, turn left and head up the gravel road signposted Gaustablikk Fjellhytter. From the gravel road, turn right and join the route of the ski lift, which you follow to the top, climbing all the time. Beyond the top of the lift you'll be walking through easy, open mountain terrain. As you round Skipsfjell, you come to a viewpoint offering magnificent views of Rjukan and Gaustatoppen. The ski slope is now just around the corner, and you follow the trail downhill and back to Gaustablikk Høyfjellshotell.

Alternative: 1 km circular walk on nature trail with information boards, benches, picnic tables and wheelchair-accessible fishing spots.



## FROM SAND TO MAJESTIC MOUNTAIN

Gaustatoppen has towered above the surrounding mountains for hundreds of thousands of years. Nevertheless, Gaustatoppen is still relatively "new" as a geological feature in the landscape. Its geological formation took at least 1,200 million years.

Gaustatoppen began life as sand deposits in rivers. About 100 million years ago, this sand was buried many kilometres deep in a mountain range, where it was compressed at high temperatures and "baked" to form quartzite, a hard rock. Subsequent erosion destroyed many kilometres of rock above, leaving the present-day landscape. Because the quartzite of Gaustatoppen was harder for the forces of nature to wear away than the surrounding rock types, the mountain has been left in majestic isolation.



## TOURIST MAGNET FOR OVER 200 YEARS

As long ago as the mid 19th century, the natural wonders of Rjukanfossen and Gaustatoppen were attracting French, German and other European visitors. In those days there was no road from Rjukan to Tuddal, and the 1,600-metre climb took 6–8 hours. In 1893 the stone bothy on the summit opened. You can also take a shortcut to the top by using Gaustabanen, a funicular railway inside the mountain. On a clear day you can see one sixth of Norway's land mass from the summit.



The cottage is important to Norwegians, both as a holiday home and as a status symbol. There were almost 418,000 holiday homes in Norway in 2008, many of them at popular winter destinations such as Gaustablikk. The view and the area's proximity to Gaustatoppen were the basis for the Gaustaområdet development, which started with Gaustablikk Høyfjellshotell in 1970 and had reached 550 cottages and 1,100 warm beds by 2006. In 2009 a new chairlift will connect Gaustablikk and Gaustatoppen skicentres.

Follow Hwy 37 in the direction of Miland as far as Dale.

After 3,7 km tum right towards Gaustaområdet. Follow the winding road uphill.

After 7,4 km turn left towards Gaustablikk.
